From the Pastor's Keyboard...

"Happy New Gear"

The week before Christmas, while many are wrapping presents and addressing Christmas cards, I was in the church office planning worship for the first few months of 2025. As of December 17, tentative worship plans for January, February and March were completed, hymns selected, and worship themes penciled in. Certainly, those worship plans are subject to change as the weeks unfold, as new music opportunities arise, and world situations become more complex; but first we must have a foundation on which to make those changes. The broad strokes are there, and the finishing touches will happen as we live into the new year.

This is the life of church work. Pastors are typically planning Lent while the rest of the church is celebrating Advent; and we plan Advent while others are purchasing their back-to-school gear. Living in the future is a must for efficient church management and worship planning, and it is a good idea for the rest of us in our day to day lives as well and in our intentional involvement with our faith.

But as we plan our future, we don't do so uninformed. We look to the past to inform us how we will behave in the future. Assessing the past year is vital to planning the next year. What worked this year, and what did not? What things were left undone that we would have rather done? In the life of the church, 2024 was a great year for CUCC, for our ministries and our work together; but what could we have done to have made it even better?


As we enter 2025, I would encourage you to have this same sort of outlook: planning ahead for the future, informed by the past. What goals do you have for 2025? How can you make plans now to get there? How does your faith figure into those plans? How can you be helpful and influential in the church as we live into 2025?

There are several ways to live into the future. One way is to plan ahead, set goals and objectives, and identify benchmarks on the way to reaching your goals. Another is to just drift through life, letting the ebb and flow of culture push us along the way. Obviously, I advocate the former. But sometimes, we are good at setting goals in our professional life, our family life, but not in our faith life. God gets the leftovers as we drift through our faith.

It is a New Year and for some, it is time to set New Year Resolutions. As we do so, let us make sure that faith goals are part of our resolutions. What can we "resolve" to do to bring us closer to God? Intentional time spent in Bible Study or prayer? Commitment to participation in worship? Serving God in intentional ways, such as working at Loaves and Fishes, Room at the Inn, Ronald McDonald House, or the Food Bank? Make God a part of your New Year Resolutions, and it will be a great 2025, indeed!



### **Moderator's Moment**

### Which Comes First? Gratitude or Stewardship?

(Shelly Adams was recently elected by the Church Council to fill the vacant position of Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team Chair. To introduce her to the congregation, she will be writing the Moderator's Moment this month.)

Which comes first - gratitude or stewardship? That's likely a chicken-or-the-egg question. And perhaps it doesn't matter. I believe that starting with either will lead to both.

Our lives are gifts from God, gifts that arise from God's generosity and love. That's something to be grateful for, isn't it? But gratitude isn't a cup we can fill once then draw on for the rest of our lives.

Instead, gratitude is a lifelong practice. I recently read an article online about a woman whose life was transformed by a very simple act: writing down 1,000 things for which she is grateful. This woman had suffered much tragedy. Her younger sister was crushed under a truck's wheels. She mourned alongside her brother-in-law as he and his spouse buried two of their infant sons. She raised a large family on a limited income. But recognizing the many little blessings she receives - a sunrise, a cup of hot coffee, a baby's belly laugh - changed her life. Her gratitude and her openness to seeing things for which she ought be grateful have made her more present to her loved ones, and brought her closer to God.

So how do we cultivate - or grow - our gratitude? There are lots of ways: prayer, looking for the positive in all situations, expressing gratitude to those you love, recalling things for which you are grateful at the end of each day, and maybe even writing down the 1,000 blessings for which you are grateful.

We are called to gratitude: "*Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.*" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

And gratitude can inspire us all to lean into stewardship in new ways - time stewardship, talent stewardship, environmental stewardship, spiritual stewardship, and financial stewardship. Jerry Keisling made a motion to approve Shelly Adams as the new Finance and Stewardship chair. Judi Privitt seconded the motion. Motion passed. Judi Privitt made a motion to approve the agenda with a second from Mary Lorber-Solt. The motion passed. The minutes were not available at this meeting and will be approved in December. ### Fear, Hope, and Action in the Changing of God's Creation

2023 was the hottest year on record. Greenhouse gas emissions continue to rise, trapping the sun's heat, advancing global warming. Wildfires, droughts, heat waves, hurricanes, and deforestation are increasing in frequency and severity. Changing land-use (particularly increasing conversion of habitats into agricultural land,) is threatening the world's population of animals. More than 500 species of land animals are likely to be lost to extinction over the next 20 years.

In the midst of all of this, fear is natural. We fear for the wellbeing of God's creation. We fear for the marginalized peoples in the world who are experiencing the impacts of climate change much more than middle class Americans. We fear the changes we see in the natural places we love. And we fear the impact that climate change will have on our children, our grandchildren, and our great grandchildren.

But as Christians, we also have hope. In Romans 8:24-25, Paul writes, "For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope, for who hopes for what one already sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." We care about creation because we are part of creation. We are inexorably intertwined in it. Hope for creation also means hope for ourselves.

We're all familiar with James 2:17 - "So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead." We had a recent discussion in Adult Sunday School about James and Paul, and discussed how James isn't actually contradicting Paul's assertion that we are saved by faith alone. Rather, when we have faith, our works arise from that faith. In other words, our faith compels good works.

Just as faith inspires work, I believe that hope inspires action. Moving from fear to hope to action regarding the changing climate puts our faith in motion to mend and heal God's creation. As we do this, we build up God's community and work to eliminate the injustices in the use of the gifts of creation - water, land, and air. And as a bonus: the fear subsides and our hope expands.

### **CUCC IS WORKING IN INDONESIA**

Located in Kupang, Indonesia, House of Hope is a shelter for former victims of human trafficking, providing a safe haven for emotional recovery and assistance with transitioning back to community life. The project is a ministry of Global Missions partner, the Evangelical Protestant Church of East Timor (GMIT). Because the experience of each candidate is unique, House of Hope takes a social work approach to assessing the social resources, needs, and interests of each participant. With personalized care, each woman has the support she needs to begin the healing process. The organization strives to provide hope and transformation, reflecting the

love and teachings of Christ while fostering sustainable development and holistic well-being in the region.

Through <u>Global Ministries</u>, CUCC is a partner in mission with the Evangelical Protestant Church of East Timor (GMIT) and, through them, we are actively working with many families in Indoneisa. This month, please keep Global Ministries, GMIT, and the people of Indonesia in your prayers!



### **MISSION WITH CHIAPAS- IMMERSION EXPERIENCE JUNE 18-25, 2025**

Churches of the Missouri Mid-South Conference have travelled to Chiapas six times in the past twelve years, working alongside the <u>Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research</u>, one of our Global Ministries Mission partners in Chiapas. We have worked alongside them in towns and villages, learning about the people of Chiapas and the ways of life in the communities of Chiapas. We have also helped construct a new facility on the grounds at <u>The Institute</u>, a facility that has more than tripled their institutional capacity and ability to do ministry with the people of their communities.

<u>The Institute</u> is not the only Global Ministries Mission partner in Chiapas. On our last trip, we had the opportunity to work with another one of our Mission Partners, <u>Melel Xojobal</u>, an agency that works solely with children in need. <u>Melel Xojobal</u> means "True Light" in the indigenous Tzotzil language, and they focus on being a light of hope for children whose only other alternative is the dark of hopelessness.

**Our next "Mission Trip" to Chiapas will be the summer of 2025! We will leave St. Louis on June 18 and return on June 25.** While we are in Chiapas, we will spend most of our time in the city of <u>San Cristobal</u> working with <u>The Institute</u> and Melel Xojobal. We will have the opportunity to see several indigenous museums, including the Chocolate Museum, and immerse ourselves in the culture of Chiapas. We will spend time in the marketplaces and worship at an indigenous church. We will learn about the life and context of the Indigenous Mayan communities that make up Chiapas, and we will even do some work, but work is not the focus of the trip. Education and relationship are the focus. The work will be suited for all abilities; all are welcome to come along, from age 16 up to age 90+! (Due to the nature of the trip, we are not encouraging anyone under 16 to participate.)

The cost for this trip is \$1,500. This includes airfare, lodging for 7 days and 6 nights, food for that timeframe, transportation to and from the airport in Tuxtla Gutierrez and other transportation, and other incidentals. All expenses are included in that price except souvenirs you may wish to buy. For a week-long mission trip, it is very economical. Everyone who participates must have a current passport. It is also highly recommended that you have a current COVID vaccination. We will schedule a forum in early February to discuss more details about the trip, for anyone who has questions.

**There is a limit of ten people for this trip – so make your commitment early!** Due to transportation issues, we cannot have more than this number. If you would like to go, talk to me (<u>Pastor Rick</u>). I have packets with detailed information and registration materials. Registrations and deposits must be turned in by April 1. Registration will include the completed registration form and, a copy of your passport.

This will be an amazing, life changing experience! Make plans now to come along!
